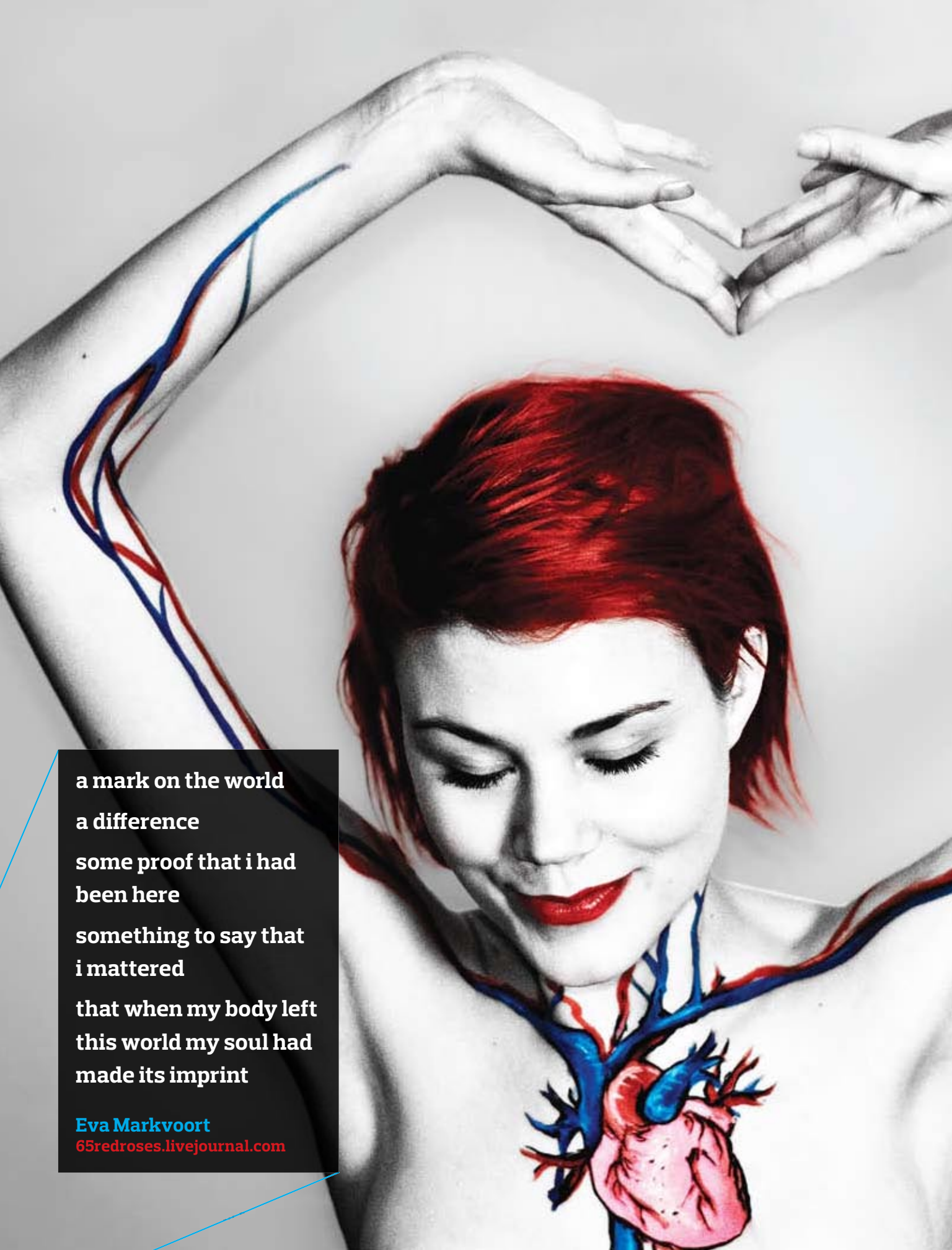

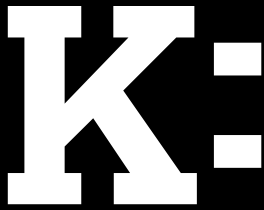

Knowledge: Pass It On

Stories of Women as Heroes

We're premiering the documentary **Sisters in Arms** as part of our Storyville series this November. It's about three female Canadian soldiers serving in combat roles in the war in Afghanistan. Their stories got me thinking about courageous women, and of the time my wife and daughters demonstrated their heroism.

Years ago, when our daughters Elvi and Kiki were still teenagers, my wife Margie and I took them on a vacation to Europe. We had just left my parents' home north of Venice and were headed to Stuttgart to visit friends. Although we were driving at the speed limit, most cars were zipping by us. A small car crammed with young people passed us at lightning speed. When it cut into our lane it made contact with the truck in front. The car flew into the air, burst apart and bounced onto the road's shoulder. I braked hard and pulled over to avoid the traffic behind us.

Margie and I approached the badly damaged car. As the young men and women crawled out, Elvi and Kiki rushed to help them. One young man was still in the wreck, wrapped around the steering wheel, his head

jammed between dashboard and window. He wasn't breathing. Just like the other men who had gathered, I was frozen by the horrific sight, thinking the guy was a goner. That's when Margie marched toward the wreck, shouting that breathing or not, the young man couldn't stay in that position. As I translated her instructions into Italian, she untangled him from the steering wheel with help from the other men, and got him flat on his back on the ground. That's when the young man started breathing again.

At about the same time, Elvi and Kiki were organizing help for the injured young women and men lying near the tangled wreck - all of them sobbing heavily, as much from shock as from their injuries. My girls had set up shade from the blistering sun and were applying improvised compresses to torn skin. They were also consoling the crash victims with soothing words and gestures. This seemed to have all played out over hours, but it was only twenty minutes or so before emergency help arrived in an air ambulance helicopter.

We got back in our car and drove away in silence: a novelty



for our talkative family. Five minutes later I pulled over and turned off the engine. That's when a wave of emotion rolled over me: thinking about those injured kids and hoping they would be okay; and of the courage and kindness of Margie, Elvi and Kiki. I broke into tears of relief and joy. Of course women are heroes, but we don't hear enough of their stories.

Passing the Badge

You'd think the criminals would know to call it quits with DCI Tom Barnaby around, but the body count just keeps rising. In true Midsomer fashion, victims meet their end this season in most unusual ways: tailor's shears, a lasso, an ancient sword. This time, though, Barnaby's had enough....

It's the 13th and final season with Tom Barnaby at the helm, with actor John Nettles announcing in early 2009 that it's time to move on to new things. "It's the end of an era for me," says Nettles. "While I'm very sad to be handing in Barnaby's police badge, he has solved nearly 200 murders, which I think meets the targets of modern policing!" The producers promise that Tom Barnaby won't make his exit as yet another victim of Midsomer's preposterously high murder rate. "I wanted to die in noble fashion in the service of my country and then be buried with full military honours in Westminster Abbey," says Nettles. "In the event, Tom and his long-suffering wife Joyce will simply retire. It's always better to leave when people want more." Thankfully, Tom's retirement doesn't mark the end of **Midsomer Murders**. Actor Neil Dudgeon will take over at the start of the 14th season, which began filming in late July. Dudgeon plays DCI John Barnaby (pictured above right), a cousin of Tom Barnaby. He'll be introduced this season in the November 6 episode, *The Sword of Guillaume*, when Tom enlists his help in solving a crime in Brighton. "If Neil has half the good times that I have had on Midsomer then he will be in seventh heaven," says Nettles. "I am only worried that he is much younger than I am and a much better actor!" Nettles' final episode airs on Knowledge on December 18.

Filmmaker Beth Freeman shares her inspiration for **Sisters in Arms**

In 2004 my sister Tamar joined the Canadian Forces, and just over a year into her full-time military career, learned she would be heading to Afghanistan.

My family was terrified; we never imagined that this petite woman would be sent to one of the more dangerous regions in the world. As a combat medic Tamar would experience frontline duty. I was torn by my love for my sister and distaste for a career that put her life in great danger. But Tamar was committed and determined; she was looking forward to her chance for deployment.

Confronted by the reality of my sister taking up arms, I picked up a camera and documented the reactions of family, friends and strangers. Tamar also had a camera, and her stories, revealed in video diaries, photos, email updates and phone calls, presented a startling reality of life on the frontlines.

Upon her return, Tamar reluctantly agreed to be filmed as she re-adjusted to "normal" life. It was a hard time for her; she had been under fire and witnessed horrific violence and death, but she gave me unlimited access to document her stories and insightful reflections.

I knew that her experiences and those of other female soldiers provided a perspective that had yet to be explored. Tamar's stories are the inspiration for **Sisters in Arms**.

This Way of Life

Shot over four years in the remote, rugged beauty of New Zealand, *This Way of Life* is an intimate portrait of Peter Karena and his family.

Masterful in the saddle and Hollywood handsome, Peter lives by an internal code of values and honour largely lost in modern times. He is a horse-whisperer, philosopher, hunter, builder, husband and father. Despite seemingly overwhelming challenges, Peter refuses to compromise. Especially troubling to Peter is his broken relationship with his adopted father – a malevolent man who refuses to leave him alone. Regardless of their hardships, the Karenas manage to never lose sight of the magic in the everyday. In this quietly profound film, the Karenas unite their philosophy with their circumstances, turning hardship into a meaningful and satisfying life.

We talked with Sumner Burstyn, who made *This Way of Life* with husband Tom Burstyn.

K: How did the idea for the documentary come about?

SB: Driving into work in town, one of my daughters and I would see this extremely beautiful man riding along the side of the road on his horse. Sometimes he'd have a child clinging on to the saddle with him and sometimes not, and his long hair would be flying out behind him. It was such a romantic image that Tom and I engineered a meeting with him. And then we met his beautiful wife and all their amazing children. The film grew as our relationship with them grew.

K: Some very dramatic events unfold in the film, like their family home burning down. How did you get such access?

SB: We were a close part of their lives, and were invited in at all times. One of our sayings is that the gods of documentary really shone on us in that film. I think it has something to do with if you make a film from the heart, that comes through.

K: Why do people respond so deeply to the film?

SB: I think it's because they feel they know the Karenas and understand where they're coming from. One of the things as filmmakers that we set out to do was to show this family in a way that was not judgemental but was the way they see themselves. They don't see themselves as poor, poverty-stricken or in any way reduced. They see themselves as coping really well with their lives.

Gandhi

BBC's definitive three-part series explores the life and legacy of Mahatma Gandhi, who stood up to the British Empire through a radical campaign of non-violence. BBC journalist Mishal Husain chronicles his story, from the little-known and decisive early years in South Africa and London, to India, where he forged a nationalist movement and eventually fell to an assassin's bullet. Throughout, the series challenges idealised images of Gandhi, examining his relationship with his wife Kasturba (pictured left), his controversial views on race and his role on the path to Indian independence.

A Message for Our Time

BBC journalist Mishal Husain – presenter of the series **Gandhi** – grew up in a family who dismissed the Indian icon as a fruit-and-nut eating crank. Her grandparents were Muslims in India at the time of Independence, and she was always conscious that there was something of a gap between the conventional wisdom about Gandhi and her grandparents' opinions. But it wasn't until the filming of the series that she gained the understanding to bridge that gap.

"When I reflect on my family's critical stance on Gandhi, I realize that it was a product of the politics of the time. By the time my grandparents were young adults, the battle lines between India's Muslims and Hindus had tragically been drawn – and when Gandhi's dream of independence finally materialised, it would be accompanied by horrific scenes of communal violence.

I've thought often about the effect that had on Gandhi in his final weeks – he had just

five and a half months to live after freedom came in August 1947. It could have destroyed him, but instead he was energised – working tirelessly to stop the bloodshed and saving many Muslim lives.

His legacy in India can be seen in its proud democratic tradition and in the activists who apply his principles to their campaigns for the poor, for human rights and for the environment. His image is iconic, but his is still a message for our time, and we should be listening today."

Island of Sand




Far off the coast of Nova Scotia lies a narrow curve of sand called Sable Island. Located in the stormiest part of the North Atlantic, the island - known as the "Graveyard of the Atlantic" - has caused over 350 recorded shipwrecks since 1583. For hundreds of years, most believed that the wild horses that roam its sandy dunes (**Chasing Wild Horses**, Monday at 9pm) were descendants of shipwreck survivors. While the romantic notion persists, the horses are actually descended from domestic animals brought to the island in the late 1700s. Recognizing the fragility and special nature of Sable Island, the Government of Canada and Nova Scotia are currently working together to ensure its permanent protection.

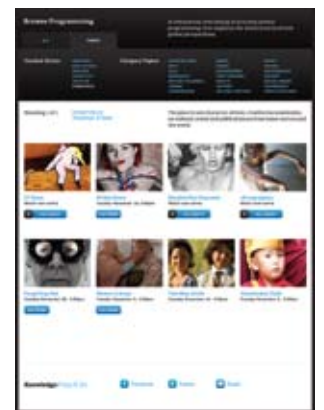

Claim to Fame

This week on **Aperture** (Thursday at 10pm), we turn the lens on silent film actress Mary Pickford, the first international superstar. Born and raised in Toronto, Pickford's enormous talent brought her to the height of fame in the 1920s, while her private life, especially her "romance of the century" with Hollywood heartthrob, Douglas Fairbanks, thrilled fans around the world. She was also a sophisticated businesswoman who co-founded film studio United Artists. But her golden touch faltered upon the arrival of talking pictures. She seemed to underestimate their impact, famously stating that "adding sound to movies would be like putting lipstick on the Venus de Milo."

Dinosaur Dreams

Creator J.J. Johnson talks about the making of Dino Dan.

"Imagine it, you're three years old and someone tells you that millions of years ago there were giant creatures that were as long as two school buses, had boney spikes and teeth as big as bananas. And that one day, an asteroid from space smashed into the earth and wiped them all out.... It's just incredible stuff."

That's what J.J. Johnson taps into as the creator and director of popular children's show **Dino Dan**. The live-action series is about a 10-year-old boy who's so infatuated with dinosaurs he's able to imagine them into the real world.

J.J., whose other hit series include *This is Daniel Cook* and *Roll Play*, turned to the experts for advice about the dinosaurs in the series.

"The Royal Tyrrell Museum was an amazing asset. Their

palaeontologists were instrumental in ensuring that our dinosaurs were accurate, both in behaviour and look. They reviewed our CG dinosaur models, shooting scripts and even gave us some great episode ideas."

Each episode is based around a question, like "Were some dinosaurs warm blooded?" and "Did dinosaurs look after their babies?" J.J. and his story editor Christin Simms then came up with relatable kid situations that would mirror these story points; for example, playing hockey outside and looking after your baby brother.

The old adage says never work with kids and animals, to which J.J. would add: "And CG dinosaurs! One of my favourite episodes follows Dan, his younger brother Trek and their dog Doug the Pug as



they chase a *Compsognathus* (one of the smallest known dinosaurs) around the house. Getting two kids and a dog to react to something that wasn't there was spectacularly difficult but the results are amazing. Eventually, after 26 episodes, the cast and crew could all 'see' the dinosaurs."

And so can you (and the kids!) - catch **Dino Dan** weekdays at 5pm, weekends at 9am.



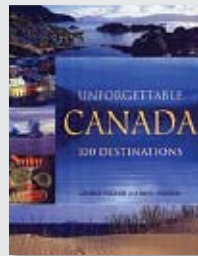

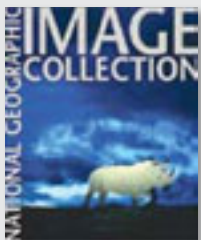
