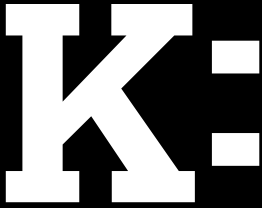

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Knowledge: Pass It On

The Warhol

It's ironic that the artist who came up with the "15 minutes of fame" concept should leave as enduring a legacy as a museum. "The Warhol", as it's affectionately known by locals, is in the former industrial city of Pittsburgh.

Murray Battle (our Director of Independent Production) and I had stopped in the city on our way back from a tour of Frank Lloyd Wright's modernist masterpiece "Fallingwater" in rural Pennsylvania.

After a long period of decline, the industrial part of Pittsburgh was slowly being redeveloped as an entertainment district. By contrast, the prosperous side was where the hospitals, universities, research centres, museums and galleries were clustered, with names of prominent founding patrons such as Mellon and Carnegie chiseled in granite.

I was reminded of Richard Florida's book, *The Rise of the Creative Class*, about how knowledge-based industries take root in cities where cultural life is thriving, diverse and plentiful because it attracts the talented and the skilled who can choose where to live.

The Warhol was our last stop before heading home. It had all the usual features of a museum; permanent collection, traveling exhibit, archives, gift shop, café. One notable exception was the security guard stationed on each floor to watch over the tourists. Turns out "security" is provided by local artists casually employed by The Warhol to keep an eye on the art and engage with the curious. By helping pay the rent, the museum actively supports artists and connects them to the public.

As Murray and I considered the iconic "Campbell's Soup Can" paintings and the "Marilyn" and "Elvis" silk screen portraits, we recalled Andy Warhol's Factory; the idea being that artists of all stripes would converge at his studio - the Factory - and collaborate on new, unexpected creations.

That's what we need in Canada, I said to Murray. But if we create a factory on television instead of in a physical space, we can connect millions to a wide range of artistic expression, and offer viewers different ways of seeing and knowing the world.



At that moment, the idea of commissioning a series of short documentaries on local artists was born. I pulled my orange sweater into a small bundle, placed it on my head and asked Murray to commemorate the occasion with a photo. Four years later three sets of arts shorts, collectively known as "The Fifty", will premiere on Knowledge Network. Only time will tell what will have its "15 minutes of fame" and what will endure. But that's the fun of it, isn't it?

In **12 Takes**, seven BC filmmakers give their takes on a dozen BC artists, from Jenn Strom's whimsical, animated exploration of the works of Nick Bantock, to Kevin Eastwood's lively overview of the pop art of Douglas Coupland, to John Bolton's visually uncompromising study of the design and architecture of Omer Arbel. *Knowledge commission.*

A Matter of Trust

We talked with John Bolton of Opus 59 Films, producer of **12 Takes** and one of seven directors who worked on the film:
K: How did you choose which artists to profile?

JB: Each director had an interest, affinity or relationship with the artists they wanted to film. Kenneth Sherman, who's done a lot of dance films, wanted to profile 605 Collective and Noam Gagnon. Kevin Eastwood has long admired Douglas Coupland's work as a visual artist. For Jenn Strom, it was a dream of hers to do a piece about Nick Bantock, and they worked together closely to create this segment. Jesse Savath, who's also a photographer, is an admirer of David Burdeny's work. Blaine Thurier is in the same band as Carl Newman. Katrin Bowen



used to do spoken word poetry with Shane Koyczan. And I had worked before with the National Broadcast Orchestra.

K: What's most important when making films like this?

JB: All the filmmakers earned the artists' trust. That's why we were able to get such access; not only to process but to emotional intimacy.

K: What do you hope audiences come away with?

JB: I hope that **12 Takes** will not only introduce audiences to a dozen BC artists but also seven BC filmmakers. The films, I think, are works of art themselves.

In **A Window Looking In**, directors Tara Hungerford and Eric Hogan profile 12 BC-based artists, among them writer William Gibson, designer/sculptor Martha Sturdy, photographer Fred Herzog and singer/songwriter Sarah McLachlan. Visually bold and captivating, the film peers into the artists' inner worlds to uncover common truths about creativity, the artistic process and living and working as an artist in British Columbia. *Knowledge commission.*

Chasing Sarah

Perserverance paid off for directors Tara Hungerford and Eric Hogan when, after 11 months of back-and-forth with Sarah McLachlan's managers, they were able to secure an interview with her. The catch: they had to travel to Edmonton where she was getting ready for a Lilith Fair concert.

When Tara and Eric arrived at Rexall Place, they were told to pick somewhere for the interview. They found an area on the concourse that was somewhat quiet, despite being next to where the roadies were eating. From their cartloads of options, they dressed the set with antique radios, flowers and a pot of jasmine tea. "Oh, is that tea for me?" said Sarah when she arrived, settling in for a relaxed chat.



Like all the portraits in the film, the piece on Sarah captures the essence of not only the artist, but the person. "Our hope is that the audience will come away feeling inspired, and appreciating what makes each of these artists unique," says Tara.

Bloodied but Unbowed: Early Vancouver Punk

Tuesday, September 28 at 10pm

Repeats at 1am

In the late '70s and early '80s, punk music reared its ragged rancid head and let forth a rebel howl. Director Susanne Tabata's **Bloodied But Unbowed: Early Vancouver Punk**, the first in-depth chronicle of Vancouver's original punk scene, captures the raw essence of a time and place, with music and stories from the surviving stars who made it happen. The Rainbow Warriors of Waiheke Island

Six activists put their ideals into action on the Greenpeace ship *Rainbow Warrior*, until a bomb attack put an end to it. Now they are living together on Waiheke, a small New Zealand island. Advancing age causes them to consider: what has their activist past achieved for the world and for themselves?



The First Movie

Tuesday, October 12 at 9pm

Repeats at midnight

What's it like to be a child in war - not when the conflict is raging, but when kids are telling stories or playing games? In this dream-like documentary, filmmaker Mark Cousins hands out digital video cameras to the children of a Kurdish-Iraqi village and asks them to film what they wish, with wondrous results. *Knowledge commission.*

K: Rocking Reunion

It was a family reunion of sorts as aging punk rockers relived the glory - some might say gory - days at two sold-out screenings of Susanne Tabata's **Bloodied But Unbowed** at Vancouver's DOXA Documentary Film Festival in May. The biggest laugh, according to *The Province's* Tom Harrison, was seeing two of punk's original stars, Randy Rampage and Brad Kent, pulling up to the Granville Seven in a stretch limousine: "...Riding in a limo in '78 wasn't a punk thing to do, but 30 years later it seems typically irreverent, if not ironic." Later, in true punk rock fashion, one of the audience members - photographer Bob Strazicich, whose late 1970s photographs of *The Dishrags* were used in the film - was sent to St. Paul's Hospital emergency after getting whacked in the head by a flying giveaway skateboard. Rock on!

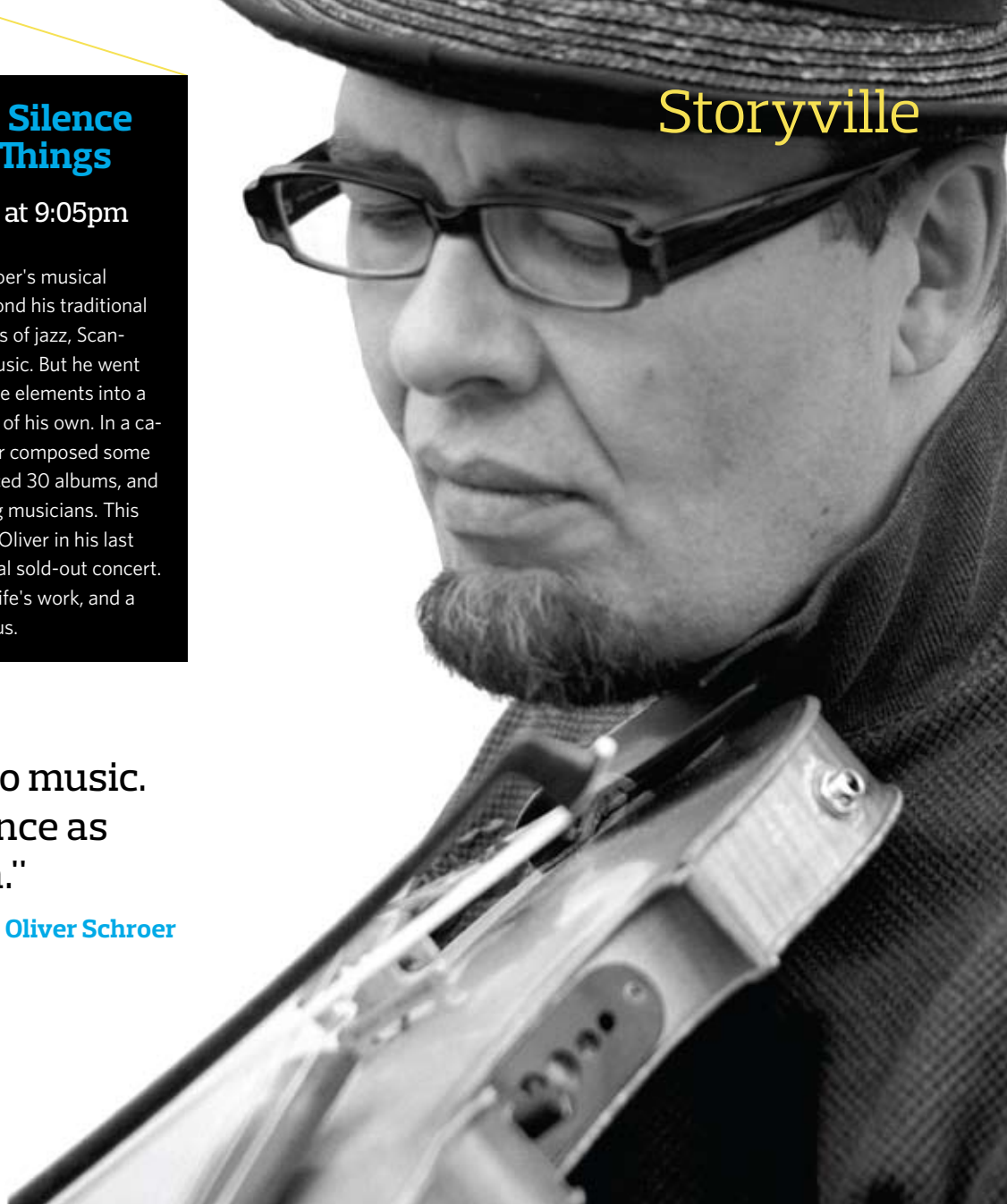

Oliver Schroer: Silence at the Heart of Things

Tuesday, October 26 at 9:05pm
Repeats at midnight

Fiddler/composer Oliver Schroer's musical explorations took him far beyond his traditional Canadian roots into the realms of jazz, Scandinavian, Balkan and Asian music. But he went much further. He melded these elements into a unique and recognizable style of his own. In a career cut short by illness, Oliver composed some 1,000 pieces of music, produced 30 albums, and inspired a generation of young musicians. This moving documentary follows Oliver in his last months, culminating in his final sold-out concert. It's a joyful celebration of his life's work, and a tribute to his undeniable genius.

Shelagh Rogers: On Oliver, Heartbeat and Knowledge

"There was some great mystery he was in touch with, something about the heart of joy," remarks broadcast-



journalist Shelagh Rogers in the documentary **Oliver Schroer: Silence at the Heart of Things**.

Shelagh, who has hosted flagship programs with CBC Radio, including **This Morning, Sounds Like Canada** and, currently, **The Next Chapter**, first met the late fiddler/composer through radio interviews, but they became friends beyond the airwaves.

"Whenever I saw him, he always had some really great

cheese, chocolate or turkish delight to share. He loved talking over food. We didn't see each other a lot, but every encounter was intense and honest and deep and playful - like his music."

Shelagh's passion for the arts makes her the perfect choice to host our Pledge Campaign. Along with Vicki Gabereau and Bill Richardson, she'll join us on Knowledge this fall.

Asked what she thinks of Knowledge, Shelagh says, "In a word - life-sustaining. Okay, two words. I am so thankful for a network that still believes that viewers are smart and have a thirst to learn. I always come away with a broader perspective. And not to be all pointy-headed... I love Heartbeat - though I still miss Greengrass - and I caught every episode of Morse."

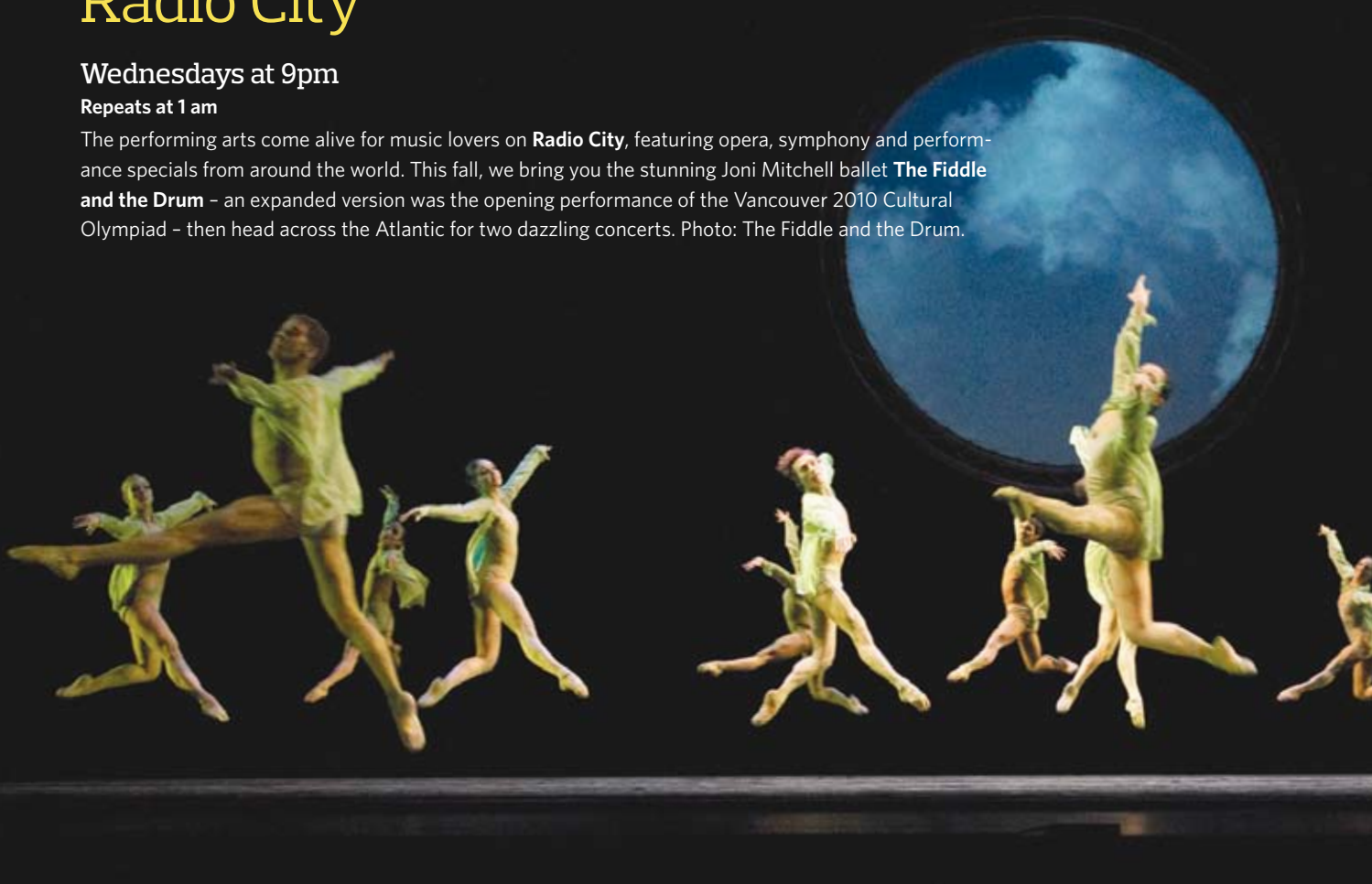


Radio City

Most of the trips involved work on development projects in his field of public health and epidemiology, but others were more relaxing sojourns with his late wife Jean, to whom he was married for 63 years.

It's been an adventurous and rewarding life, although perhaps not always the most comfortable: aside from the third-world realities of development work, there were the perilous conditions of his five-year stint in the Royal Canadian Navy during WWII. After the war ended, he attended medical school at Queen's University in Kingston, then set up practice in Victoria, and later Dawson Creek ("I was one of two doctors in town and the only doctor for a third of the province") along with other BC towns before settling in Vancouver and taking a faculty position at UBC. Jean was an accomplished equestrienne, so they raised three boys on a Southlands horse farm, which he now lends to a local riding stable.

Along with the many merits he's received for his work, Dr. Mackenzie is founding director and president of the not-for-profit Canadian Marine Environment Protection Society. An avid diver, he kept up the sport until the age of 80. "I had to stop when I could get into the water but not out!" he says.

Dr. Mackenzie, a longtime Knowledge Partner and Legacy Circle Member, appreciates the fact he can enjoy his favourite Knowledge programs (**Heartbeat**, **The Royal**, **National Geographic**, **Dogs with Jobs** and documentaries) without commercials trying to sell him stuff he doesn't want. As for why he thinks people should support Knowledge, he says: "Well, it would go away if we don't. And that would be a shame."

Finding new perspectives on Knowledge.

The trip from Karin and Mike McCarty's Summerland home to Vancouver for the screening of **Our First Voices** was more than just a nice way to get away for a few days. For Karin, it was another opportunity to reconnect with her family heritage.

Karin began digging deeper into her family's roots two years ago, when she stumbled across a photo of her great-grandmother, Janimetga (Jane) Jeameya, on the Gabriola Island website. Jane, a full-blood Cowichan whose father and brother were chiefs, married an Irish man named Thomas Degnen and moved to Gabriola where they were among the first settlers.

The website photo spurred Karin's Degnen side of the family to plan a reunion; then a cousin decided to contact the Cowichan side. The result was a huge gathering of more than 250 members of Karin's extended family on Gabriola last summer. Re-discovering the Cowichan side of her family was a very powerful experience for Karin.

She had similar feelings when she watched **Our First Voices**. "When I think about the part of the film with the young woman writing a song for her baby and singing it to her in her 'first voice', it just gives me goosebumps. It's a subject very close to my heart. I think it's important for people to see what First Nations' people are doing to help themselves."

The evening reinforced the way the couple feels about Knowledge, and why they've chosen to support it: "I think films like this open people's understanding of life", says Karin. "That's what Knowledge has always done for me."

Her husband, Mike, agrees: "It not only edifies you, it broadens your perspective. Knowledge is a true window on the world."

First Nations filmmakers fêted at screening of Knowledge documentary.

Four award-winning First Nations directors – Helen Haig-Brown, Kelvin Redvers, Zoe Leigh Hopkins and Lisa Jackson – were right to feel proud as their outstanding

work on **Our First Voices** was showcased at a special screening of the film at Vancouver's Vancity Theatre on June 9. Commissioned by Knowledge, the documentary

celebrates 13 BC First Nations languages and pays tribute to the drive to preserve and revitalize them for future generations.

At the event, attended by Knowledge supporters and guests from First Nations communities and organizations, the filmmakers spoke about the importance of preserving BC's indigenous languages.

"There's the misconception that these are hunter-gatherer languages and they were good for an earlier time, but they don't really have

anything to offer now. Or that in speaking these languages, the meaning is the same as it is in English. But that's totally false. Linguists around the world are fascinated by North American indigenous languages because they are so complex," said Lisa Jackson. "For example, imagine what it would be like if you put 'I' at the end of sentences instead of the beginning, as English usually does. The whole way you look at the world changes."
